12 key terms & definitions

Open access (OA) is a simple concept that can appear more complicated than it really is. To help with this the OA team has prepared some handy definitions of the key terms and concepts.

An **Author's Accepted Manuscript** is the version of an article accepted after peer review and after any corrections but <u>before</u> final publication.



Article, Book, and Chapter processing charges are levied by publishers to pay for them to appear fully open access. The University can often help with these.



Publishing OA means you can keep control over your work. With a **Creative Commons licence** you retain copyright and decide how your work is shared, adapted, and reused.



A journal with a **Diamond** OA policy will publish articles fully open access without any processing charges to be paid.



A **Gold** OA journal requires payment of an **APC** for an article to appear fully OA on its website.

HYBRID Open



The University's new fund enables authors to make as much of their research open access as possible.

Green OA involves uploading the **AAM** version of your article to a repository while the published version usually appears behind a journal's paywall. Also known as **Self Archiving**



Access

A journal that publishes a mix of OA articles paid for by **APC**s and non-OA articles behind a paywall is a **Hybrid**.



A blanket agreement with a publisher that covers subscription <u>and</u> any OA publishing costs is called a **Read & Publish agreement**. Our agreements cover hundreds of journals: full details <u>here</u>.

When taking the **Green** route to OA, journals often require your **AAM** to be embargoed for a time. By adding a **Rights Retention statement** and a **CC BY licence** you can avoid this and make your **AAM** OA without delay.

SELF Archiving

This route to open access (**Green**) means depositing your work in a repository upon acceptance for publication. This can be our Essex Research Repository or a subject-based or central repository. More <u>here</u>.
